"A" Company, who were clearing houses on the road to Briel 676755, suffered three casualties at road junction 681744, but captured one prisoner. The FW was a Butch SS soldier and willingly gave information rejerding the enemy in Briel. He told us that our artillery fire had considerably lessened their numbers and hajor Fisher, commanding "A" Company, decided to clear the town as soon as tonk support came up. "D" Company made slow progress but managed to get on their objective at 0630 hours. Brigadier I.S.Johnston visited Tac H.Q. at 1200 hours and received the Databalion picture from the Commanding Cifficer. "A" Company was counter-attached twice, but beat the enemy off without much trouble. About 1500 hours a patrol of ten Germans came into "A" Company's lines, but machine un fire from the tamks ("A" San. 3.3.H.G.) drove them off. They lost one man. By 1730 hours the area between the forward Companies was clear of enemy, but Jerry continued to rake the area with machine un fire from dug-in positions across the Neder Rhine River. The shelling was also intense. A carrier section was sent out to "A" Company to help prevent infiltration during the night. Since the situation was sonewhat uncertain, O.Ps were established and ordered to be manned 24 hours a day. The artillery F.O.O. set himself up in the Church Tower at Driel, and rendered invaluable assistance to "A" Company by engaging enemy F.G. positions on the opposite bank of the River. The tanks went back to the rear at last light to refuel and get more annumition. A hot meal was then brought up to the forward Companies, who were very much in need of it. "C" and "B" Companies were ordered to new positions, "C" to the right of "D" and "B" to the positions695764, 692763 and 695761. Casualties for the
